






History of the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PASPA)

- 1992 PASPA was officially signed into law by George H.W Bush
- 2011 NJ Governor Chris Christie signed legislation to legalize sports betting in the state
- 2017 SCOTUS heard Christie v. NCAA
- 2018 SCOTUS struck down PASPA as violation of the 10th Amendment (Murphy v. NCAA)





Current Laws and Policies

No Responsible Gambling Provisions

14 States



d to sports betting?

Funding

- 3 states: Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania
- National Council on Problem Gambling recommends the equivalent of 1% of revenue from legalized sports betting should be dedicated to problem gambling services

Licensee Burden

 6 states: DC, Illinois, New Jersey, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia



Establishment of a Council

- 1 state: New Hampshire
- Establishment of Council for Responsible Gaming which promotes education, prevention, and treatment of problem gambling



Reporting

- 1 state: New Jersey
- Annual report on impact of sports wagering on problem gamblers and gambling addiction in New Jersey



Online Wagering

- 20 states
- Location restrictions
